From the Chairman:

Wow, another Nationals is behind us and the 2001 Nationals will be remembered for years to come. Apart from the fine job that the Airgunning Atlanta crew did at the match, the facilities were simply incredible. For most of us who are used to rather primitive gun clubs or fields to shoot at, the Tom Lowe Shooting Grounds was like a royal palace.

This was a very well run match. Directors Ken Hughes and Joel Hansel and the rest of the Atlanta crew setup three challenging courses in woods where no Field Target matches had ever been shot before. They put in a ton of work to prepare for the match and it was very evident to everyone. Ken, Joel and David Still were the range marshals for the match, they gave up the chance to shoot the match to ensure that the match ran like a well-oiled machine. As they say here in the south, "Y'all done good".

This match saw the first official AAFTA course committee. The AAFTA Board of Governors insti-

tuted the course committee as a way to check the courses prior to the US Nationals for any problems that may impact the match. Two Governors and one Associate member checked every target on every lane on all the courses for proper target setup and operation, reset string problems, target visibility, and any other problems that we might see. We found several things on the courses, most of them minor in nature. that were corrected before the match. I think that the course committee had a positive impact on the match and AAFTA plans to continue the course committee in the coming vears.

This was an election year for the AAFTA board of Governors. We had three Governors positions up for election this year. Steve Cox, who has graciously served AAFTA for many years, decided not to rerun for governor. I would like to thank Steve for his dedication and service to this organization. It has been a pleasure for me to work with Steve and to learn from him over these past three

years and I look forward to shooting with him at his new club in the coming years.

There were six candidates running for a spot on the board this year. Each candidate that was able to attend the general meeting was given a chance to address the crowd and then the floor was opened for a brief question and answer session with the candidates. The election was held and the governors elected were Ron Carlson, Cliff Smith, and Brad Troyer. We had some excellent candidates running this year and I would like to thank them for stepping forward and offering their time and talents to AAFTA.

After the elections, as is the tradition, a AAFTA fund raising auction was held. Again this year, Gary Sanders of Daystate, through Daystate America, donated a Harrier pcp rifle for the auction. PASA Ltd. donated many items, Ron Juneau donated several of his famous targets and we had many others donate various things to the auction. I would like to thank you for your generous support of AAFTA.

At the auction, we had a lot of generous buyers as well showing their support as well. One target, a target painted to look like Osama bin Laden, went for over \$200! All in all, a bit over \$3500 was raised for AAFTA, which may be a record for us. With the fund-raiser and some work over the past year by the AAFTA Secretary/Treasurer and Editor, AAFTA is on solid ground financially for the first time in many years.

The AAFTA Board of Governors had only a few announcements at the general meeting. One announcement was that next years US Nationals has been awarded to the Northern

Mississippi Airgun Club (NMAC). The match is tentatively scheduled for October 4-6 and will be a three day match with one match shot each day. The number of shots is still to be determined but will either be 120 or 150.

The other announcement was the changing of the classification rules. The two piston classes have been combined into a single class called Piston Class. The former two classes are included in the new rule as optional subclasses that may be offered by the match director at their discretion.

One thing that I forgot to announce was that our Editor, the Grand-daddy of American Field Target, Rodney Boyce, is stepping down as editor at the end of the year. He has faithfully put out the AAFTA News for five years now and has decided that it is time to shoot a bit more! At the beginning of the year the new AAFTA Editor will be Jay Olson-Goude from Minnesota. Thanks go to Rodney for his many years of service as our editor. It isn't always easy to be the editor but it is usually a thankless job. We really appreciate your time and talents that you donated to AAFTA over the years.

The 2001 Nationals was truly a match that will be remembered for a long, long time. If you couldn't be there, that is really a shame. I would like to say one more time to Ken and Joel, <u>good job</u>. Everyone I talked with said they had a great time and really enjoyed the match, even though the standing shots were incredibly hard!

2001 US Field Target Nationals

And A Good Time Was Had By All

A narrative by Ken Hughes

The days before the match were filled with tension and excitement. Had we forgotten anything? What would/could go wrong? Could we get it all done in time? We were thrilled to see that we had some early out of town help in George Gardner & Stan Lapinski. They were a lot of help in setting up the courses on Wednesday. Thanks guys!

Thursday was a busy day at the range with nearly all of the competitors showing up to do some site in and practice on the 50m-indoor/outdoor range. We had lots of help transforming the Olympic 50m range into a world-class site in range with over 100 paper target holders, so no shortage of target paper would occur. Joel Hansel and David Still handled registration; all competitors received a hospitality bag with lots of sponsor-supplied material and the official match polo shirt. It was great to see all of the familiar faces and to meet the new ones that are destined to be the future of this sport. The array of airguns on the firing line was impressive and beautiful to an airgun junky like me; it's always neat to see other peoples "toys".

Our event vendors set up shop in the upper level mezzanine, Robert Buchanan's Airguns of Arizona/Daystate and Ron Juneau's Cajun Targets both had booth space to "pedal their wares". Thank you to both of them for taking the time and expense to come.

AAFTA Board of Governor's implemented something new at this match, an AAFTA Course Committee. The committee consisted of Brad Troyer, Wade Sutherland, Cliff Smith and Don Vanderwerker and was charged with inspecting all lanes and targets for proper set up and function. Several things were noticed and suggested by the committee regarding the courses; all issues were addressed and corrected to the committee's satisfaction. I highly recommend having a committee of experts look over your courses, it helped avoid potential problems. I would like to thank the committee for taking the time required to do this inspection and for the suggestions, it helped make the event run smoother.

Friday got started early, people at the range before 7am for a 9:30 start time. The shooters meeting started at 9am and took a little longer than expected, as there was a lot to cover, but we made it onto the courses more or less on time. The day was overcast but warm, little to no wind, a good day to shoot. I can tell you I was nervous with anticipation and excitement over how the courses would be received by the shooters, worried that I might have forgotten something or a target would malfunction, etc... Well the lead started flying and targets started falling and all was good in the FT universe. The shooters kept up an even pace, thanks to the timers, and were done in good time for lunch!

Lunch was sandwiches from the Atlanta Bread Co. and homemade vegetable beef soup (made by my mom), and lots of stuff to go with them. We finished off with cookies and Deb's homemade brownies for dessert (wish I had gotten one). Amazingly all the food disappeared!

As scheduled, JP O'Connor (Olympic shooting coach) ran a 10m shooting clinic after lunch. He talked and answered questions for nearly an hour, then did some hands-on teaching while the shooters got to shoot on the electronic scoring equipment on the 10m range with loaner match rifles w/ aperture sights. It was a different 10m experience from the usual hushed silence full of concentration; we had lots of loud laughter and rowdy behavior (yes you Eric Moe, Stylie Edwards, Warren Williamson, Brad Troyer, etc.) and boy was it fun!! Just what we were hoping would happen; we know how this crowd of airgunners behaves in public.

Saturday morning came with rain falling and all eyes on the weather channel to see if the match schedule would have to be modified. The calls to Deb for internet weather updates were numerous, but it was decided that the rain had passed for the day and so the match went on as scheduled. The rain stopped around 8:45am and the wind started to pick up and the temperature started to fall rapidly, by late afternoon the temp had fallen to around 50 deg F. catching several people unprepared for the cold damp day.

The match start was delayed slightly due to several people showing up late to the range saying they had been told the match schedule had been changed. Apparently the rumor of a delayed start time had started at the hotel and quickly spread among the shooters, which caused several to stay at breakfast awhile-longer thinking no rush was needed. The delay in starting caused no problems, in fact it gave the courses more time to dry off. As the match started the match nerves surfaced again as I worried about the courses, but all went well, the "other shoe" did not fall on this match and all was still right in the FT universe! The match finished ahead of schedule and everyone ran to get inside out of the cold and have some lunch.

Lunch on Saturday was fried chicken, coleslaw, potato salad, more homemade brownies (still wish I had gotten one), and 2 kinds of homemade cobbler (Apple/blueberry and peach) with vanilla ice cream (I did get some cobbler though! It was outstanding!!).

After lunch came the 2001 AAFTA Annual Meeting and Auction. The meeting included many topics especially the "International Class" which created some heated discussion kept in civil tones. The election of 3 governors positions was decided after several candidates gave short campaign speeches and Wade read a speech on behalf of Mel Bomke who could not attend. The AAFTA Governors that were elected are Brad Troyer, Ron Carlson, and Cliff Smith, by vote of the AAFTA member clubs- democracy in action! The election was concluded with a short speech by Rodney Boyce who declared "this is the best AAFTA Board of Governors ever!", thanks Rodney for the kind words. The AAFTA auction was a huge success! Many great items of interest were donated to the auction. Thank you to all who donated items! AAFTA raised over \$3,500.00!!! I think this is a record (unconfirmed)!!! The Auction started off on a good note with John Quiter announcing a donation from "The Richard Shimizu Supper Club" of over \$500.00!! Thanks Richard and friends. Then the auction got rollin', Brad Troyer did his usual great job as auctioneer keeping things moving, with his "shill" Eric Moe to keep the bids rising ever higher, and everyone having a good time. It was good to hear the laughter of many friends filling the building, as things got lively.

A special 50m match ran by JP O'Connor took place after the AAFTA auction. The match was shot using the electronic scoring equipment in the 50m range. The shooters took 15 sight-in shots and then 10 for score, with the 10 for score being scored like finals in an Olympic event going down to the tenth of a point (ex: 10.1 /10.9/etc.). After 2 relays of 30 shooters the top 10 shooters were in the finals round. The finals were held like an Olympic shooting event finals where the official tells all "load" then after all have loaded, tells all "3-2-1 fire!" and all have 1 and one-half minutes to shoot the shot for score. Then JP would go down the line announcing each score to loud applause for 10.0 or higher OR loud laughter and heckling for lower scores, boy was that fun!! I was with JP as he was announcing and he was folding over with hysterical laughter at the jeering and rowdiness of the crowd, he said "I have never been to a finals quite like this one, man is this a fun group of guys!" (my sentiments exactly!). I know everyone thanks JP for donating his time and expertise in running both of the after match activities, Thank you JP.

Sunday morning came in crisp clear and cool but warmed up nicely as the day progressed. This was the "do or die" day, the pressure was on, lets see "who is who" in the US FT ranks. The pre-match anxiety was the worst yet, but I was almost too tired to care. I kept waiting for something to go wrong, some catastrophic failure but all went well, as planned. The pace of shooting slowed slightly due to the higher concentration levels, but the timers kept the pace moving steadily along. After all of the competitors had finished shooting their respective courses, they dismantled

the lanes and this was a BIG help, Thanks everyone! When the scorecards were all in, and tabulated then the shoot-offs took place. The shoot-offs took place in the 50m building so all could watch in comfort. In contrast to the rowdy 50m finals of the previous afternoon, the building was eerily silent during the shoot-offs (as it should be) with polite clapping as each string of shots was completed, the air was thick with the tension of the shoot-offs. Bobby Corcorran and Wade Sutherland had a shoot-off for 8th place that lasted quite a while, with Mr. Corcorran taking 8th place and Mr. Sutherland in 9th place. Mr. Corcorran showed us some impressive off hand shooting in this shoot-off. Tommy Garland, Brad Troyer and Billy Lo had a shoot-off for 5th – 7th places with Mr. Garland 5th, Mr. Troyer 6th, and Mr. Lo 7th. Mr. Garland displayed his shooting skills under pressure in this shoot-off. The final shoot-off was for 2nd place between Brian Johnson and James White with Mr. Johnson taking 2nd place and Mr. White in 3rd place. Both of these gentlemen shot well in the shoot-off with Mr. Johnson just edging out Mr. White.

Lunch on Sunday was a big event, the menu was BBQ Pork and BBQ chicken, corn on the cob, coleslaw, and baked beans with a special desert to come later at the awards ceremony. Deb and my mom and dad smoked all the meat for the BBQ, now that was some good eating! A special thank you goes out to my wife (Deb) and both of my parents for all of their hard work and doing such a great job with the food! Because we all know how important good food is at an event like this.

The awards ceremony was a joyous occasion. It started off with a surprise for me, a big birthday cake, balloons, a huge birthday card, and nearly 100 of my friends singing "Happy Birthday" to me! Thanks everyone. Of course everyone got a slice of cake. Then we got on to the awards. Mr. Bill Isaac graciously donated custom made license plates for the top 10 shooters in both the Open class and Piston class that read "Top 10 Shooter 2001 US Field Target Nationals", thank you Bill. Your 2001 US Field Target Nationals Champions are David Slade (113/120) in the Open Class and Roz Sumpter (95/120) in the Piston class. David and Roz both did some awesome shooting on tough but fair courses, good shooting gentlemen!!

To the many people who stayed to help with tear down and cleanup, to these special people goes a big thank you! You saved me countless hours of work.

To Brad Troyer goes a thank you for the loan of your nice targets, without which we couldn't have done the match.

To Randy DuTeau, the shooting facility manager, a thank you for all of the things you helped us with, too many to list. The Tom Lowe Shooting Grounds is a beautiful world-class facility that we are proud to have been able to use for this event, we hope to shoot there again someday soon.

To all of the Airgunning Atlanta members, what a great bunch of people! You came together as a well-organized team to put on a good well executed match, bravo! Thank you to all of you.

And finally, THANK YOU! to all of the competitors and attendees of the 2001 US Field Target Nationals. We very much enjoyed having all of you come to the match, without you it would all be for not. Be safe until we see you again, hopefully in the near future.



2nd Annual Badgerland Regional Field Target Championships September 8, 2001 Bristol, Wisconsin

The second annual Badgerlands saw more than a two-fold increase in attendance. The match was lengthened to 100 shots and fired in two relays on a two-course set-up. Between the two relays, our own Bill Slater and his world famous "Millies Pancake House Restaurant" provided lunch. Lots of goodies were available to raise the heart rates of even the best shooters and full bellies did prove to slow down the start of good scoring in the second round. Such is the "good-life" of an FT shooter.

The forecast for the weekend had called for severe storms, both on Friday's sight-in day as well as for Saturdays match day. Thanks to a supporting Mother Nature, neither storms nor rain were evident until the "rest" day on Sunday. The weather has cooperated all this year and we were thankful, as we had shooters from many far away states. Thanks again to all those that drove or flew from distant points. We hope that your trips were well rewarded at our venue.

During the pre-match sight-in, the winds did blow considerably and major decisions were being waged ...changed you windage setting or go with the standard and hope the trees offered enough protection to keep the POI within the KZ. Our course is set up inside a small forest with lots of huge virgin oaks and evergreens. However, there are open areas and an old creek bed that opens up some channels for the wind to swoop into play. Due to some of these challenges, the sight-in line was quite active and thanks to the new canopies, the falling hickory nuts were kept at bay from falling onto the shooters heads. It was also an opportunity to see some of the new rigs, as it was quite a haven for the new ZM Steyr of all formats, as well as the surprise new Walther LG conversion of Wicha/Matticks.

The 100 shot match was spread out on 25 double-targeted lanes, 12 on the front and 13 on the back course. Scores were posted for the first round during lunch, but as the two courses varied in total count, as well as difficulty level, they did not add much to strategizing for the second half. Targets ranged from 16 yards to one actually set at 58 yards. Kill zones ranged from less than 3/8" to 1-1/2" with majority being in the 3/4" range. We had 3 off-hands and one kneeling positions shot and quite a few up in the trees or on raised posts. Teams were comprised of two shooters and the starting lanes were staggered with an open lane between each shooting team. This allowed for a fast paced match and having open lanes between shooters prevented most backups caused by over-cautious and indecisive shooters. These formats allowed us to concentrate on shooting and be able to shoot the entire match and eat lunch in less than 6 hours. Concentration was required as the course rating was extremely difficult. We hope to be able to offer this same level difficulty for future Badgerland Regionals.

At the completion of the match, only the third place Open Division needed to be determined by a post match "shoot-off". Awards included custom etched Curved Glass Plaques and Crystal Obelisks. After the awards presentation, a free club raffle was held to distribute prizes donated by club members. In addition, AAFTA newsletter applications were distributed to newcomers and several AAFTA pins and patches were sold in support of AAFTA. Again, congratulations to all winners and a big thanks to all the participants who made the 2nd Annual Badgerlands a great success. See you next year.
