Cajun Spring Nationals

The thirteenth Cajun Spring Nationals was held on the weekend of April 6-7 at the Jean Lafitte Airgun Range in Baton Rouge, La. The event was jointly hosted by the Bayou Airgun Club and the Baton Rouge Recreation and Parks Commission. The match weekend was blessed with pleasant temperatures and fair skies, following a week of rainy weather. The lush greenery of the south La. Live oaks provided the perfect backdrop for a weekend of shooting fun, Cajun food, and the renewal of friendships among the competitors. There were 60 shooters present, most of them having participated in previous CSN matches, a couple of rookie shooters, and a number of experienced FT shooters who were first timers to Baton Rouge.

Targets were placed in the woods on 2 courses, Belle Terre, ("good earth") and Lagniappe ("something extra"). Competitors were squadded in groups of 3. They shot a 50 shot match on

Saturday on one course, and another 50 shot match on Sunday on the other course. Timers were used to keep things moving smoothly. Each of the courses had one unique double kill zone target, in which each hit counted for a half point. This explains some shooters' final score ending with a half point. Saturday's match went smoothly, with only a few quick delays. Everyone

walked out of the woods with a big appetite after having smelled the chicken and sausage jambalaya being cooked on site. Scores were bunched up on the high end after the first days scores were posted. However, Robert Crocker was the only shooter to ace the course. One high scoring competitor thought the course was set too easy, another commented that the level of competitors made it seem difficult. One thing was sure. There were many top competitors "in the hunt"

at the end of the first day, and the rest of the shooters seemed satisfied that they had knocked down a bunch of La. Swamp critters.

A change in daylight savings time brought shooters to the range an hour earlier on Sunday morning, some of them a bit bleary eyed. After a short safety meeting, shooters met their fellow squad members on the other course. The skies were partly cloudy, temps were mild, and there was a noticable breeze early in the day. Once again, the match went smoothly, with only 3 very short delays due to broken reset strings. Match director Jack Kirkendoll and his brother Terry pondered the possibility of there being many tied scores that would need to be resolved in

order to determine awards . The match ended with smells of crawfish etouffee wafting over the sight in range. Shooters gathered quietly and watched as Linda Juneau and Mary Kirkendoll posted the second day's scores. Steve Schulz emerged as winner of the Open class with a score of 99, while Brad Troyer took top honors in the Piston gun class with a score of 93.5 There were a number of ties for second and third place, which were quickly settled by a timed shootoff at spinners placed at extended range in the wind. Other award winners, other shooters ,

and their scores and equipment are shown in the accompanying statistics chart.

A donated target was raffled off with the entire \$178 proceeds going to AAFTA. \$200 was also donated by the Shimizu supper club. Bob Winer recognized the top Junior shooter, Craig Daste, with a \$25 gift certificate, a set of BKL scope mounts, and a certificate.

I would like to thank all who attended and participated in our match. Special thanks go to our loyal and devoted club members, and to my loving wife Linda, who did the bulk of the work behind the scenes. Finally, thanks to all of you who helped cleanup and take down the targets. May God bless America, and our sport.

However, Cliff Smith won the Piston Class with a runaway exceptional score of 42 which makes him Uno Numero Pistonero.

The course layout that Henry Hartsfield and Bill Isaac put together was no place for sissies which was compounded by changeable winds with no thanks to that erratic woman, Mother Nature. Half the total misses were attributable to long shots as "Wind Doping" turned into another Florida lottery (or voting ballot?).

The course consisted of ten lanes, three (2 shot) targets each - near, mid and far. The reset string spools were color coded Red, White and Blue to correspond with near, mid and far targets. This little nicety served to avoid the too often aggravation of yanking on the wrong string.

AAFTA rules prevailed and shooters were informed that they could shoot as many targets standing as they desired to their heart's content but there were no takers.

This first IRA match was certainly a success if the absence of moans, groans and grumbles is a yard-stick. Special thanks to Dick Otten's donation of one of his well made targets: a grizzly bear. It was pressed into service on the course replacing a tired vintage target and it behaved flawlessly.

The weather was more like a winter shoot than the first field target match of the season. A cold, brisk east wind at about 10 to 15 mph was in our face throughout the match coupled with the cold. The ever threatening snow, sleet and rain combination lead us to shoot in the old airgun range with a shortened course as we had but 6 shooters show up.

The 4 shooters that came along with Rick Stoutenburg and myself were all newer shooters, with new equipment and a lot of questions. They are full of enthusiasm for the sport and despite today's tribulations, all appeared to have a good time. It is really wonderful to see these people and their reactions to a knockdown. It brings back pleasant memories of when I got started and the veterans were there to teach and encourage me. I hope that we so called veterans could get back some of their enthusiasm and sense of fun at hitting a KZ. Isn't this refreshing? So, I probably got as much out of today as they did and I sincerely hope to see them back again and again.

The course was 10 lanes with 2 shots per target shot at the old airgun range. Most of the targets were 18 to 30 yards (that's the maximum). Lane 9 was a ½ inch at 29 yards and nobody touched it. That's how tough the wind was just off the berm. We noted that the new airgun range building roof and sidewalls are nearly complete after being lost in the snowstorm of not too long ago. Perhaps the concrete will be poured for the floor and the storage shed will be moved by the time of the next match. The match date is May 19th. So mark your calendars, please.

ABOUT STANDING SHOTS

If you are overjoyed when confronted with a standing shot at a Field Target match, do not bother to read any further. Field Target emerged as a freestyle airgun shooting game that was a viable alternative to other existing disciplines at the time: namely Silhouette and 10 Meter, both of which mandate the standing shooting position. Originally, Field Target was shot from a sitting position as it was far more accurate than the standing shot. Keep in mind that precision accuracy is the pinnacle attainment that all FT shooters seek to attain. This explains the ever present question about an airgun - "How does it group?". A clean kill, you might say, is desirable.

Some years passed and somehow one standing shot was occasionally incorporated in some matches, ostensibly to serve as a tie breaker. More and more standing shots came into the game as it was welcomed and promoted by proficient off-hand marksman.

The situation today, I feel, is that "standers" bias the game toward the younger and fit shooters which is discriminatory. The ironic thing is that the vast majority of shooters of all ages and shapes that I have come into contact with dislike and dread the "standers". One has to conclude that standing shots make our game less enjoyable for many, many shooters.

My proposal is not to eliminate standing shots but to relegate them to a different but nevertheless vital and important category. By far, most shots (90 to 95%) are "sitters" which reflects the heart of the game. These hits would constitute your score. The standing shots (SS), 5 to 10% of the course, would serve as the important function of tie breakers. I'll use my shooting at the Cajun Spring Nationals as an example. Of the 94 sitting shots I managed to hit 90. Not too shabby for one who has three quarters of a century under his belt. But when it came to the 6 "standers" I maimed 5 of the critters for a final score of 90 -- 1 SS. If J.Doe hit 90 "sitters" and 2 SS, he would rank ahead of me. However, if his score was 87 "sitters" and 5 SS, I would rank above him as our basic scores reflecting the vast majority of classic field target challenges would be 90 to his 87. Since there was no tie in basic scoring the SS shots would not come into play.

This scoring procedure introduces a more level playing field for most of the competitors but the edge in tied scores would be in favor of the better standing shooters. There is another plus for this scoring procedure as it will relieve practically all of the match director's onerous chore of resolving ties. By the way, it should be mentioned that this procedure does not entail any changes in the AAFTA Shoot Rules. I would appreciate your thoughts on all this, preferably by e-mail. Thanks

FT Course Difficulty Rating System

Years ago I developed a simple method for estimating the difficulty of the courses I was designing. It gave me an idea of how easy or hard the individual target and overall course would be for an upcoming match. There have been some questions about the system recently so I thought it would be a good time to write about it again.

When I first developed the rating system, I played with some factors and equations until I settled on using the distance (in yards) divided by the kill zone size to give a difficulty rating for each target. For example, a ½" kill zone Squirrel placed in a tree at 21 yards would have a difficulty rating of 42 while a 1" skunk at 32 would be rated at 32. Once the individual difficulty rating for each target is known the overall course rating can be determined be averaging all the individual target difficulty ratings.

After a few years of using the system and input from other users, the following difficulty rating charts were developed. The chart on the left relates the difficulty factor to a degree of hardness for individual targets while the chart on the right does the same of the overall course difficulty. Two charts were developed since there can be different factors involved when figuring the overall course difficulty. A single target with a DF of 37 is considered Hard, but if you string a whole bunch of them together on a course then there are fatigue and concentration factors that come into play during the match which puts the course on the Expert level.

As others used the system it was pointed out to me that some another factor needed to be added to the system for shots that were more difficult than others like standing, kneeling or extra windy shots. So a difficulty factor was added to the equation making the difficulty rating equation:

Difficulty Rating = (Distance / Kill Zone Size) * Difficulty Factor

With a bit of testing and tweaking of the difficulty factors, the following difficulty factors have been developed:

Type of Shot	Difficulty Factor
Standing	2
Kneeling	1.5
Windy Shot	1.25
Extreme Up/Down	1.25
Extreme Light/Dark	1.125
Shots Past 40 Yards	1.125

This system has worked really well for accurate course planning and it allows for better comparisons between matches from different venues. The system can be teamed up with a spreadsheet program to facilitate match planning. A sample of the course planning spreadsheet I use (in Microsoft Excel) has been posted on the AAFTA website (www.aafta.org) under the "Free Downloads" link. The website also has this difficulty rating system posted on it for future reference. I would encourage all clubs to use the rating system when planning their courses and report the course difficulty in their write-ups. That will allow the rest of the Field Target community to more accurately compare match results. If there are any questions about the difficulty rating system, please feel free to contact me about it.

I was fortunate enough to drop only one more shot on the day, ending up with the high score of 54/60. We had a shoot off for third, which was offhand at 25 yards. It took 3 rounds and my buddy, Dennis took third. Although conditions were not ideal, it felt great to be out shooting with the guys again.
