Waterloo field Target Club Christmas Match December 14, 2003

For a mid December day in Southwestern Ontario, the weather was pretty much what one would expect—not hope for, but expect. There was snow on the ground, the temperature remained below freezing all day and some snow started falling to complete the winter scene. We set up a twenty-four shot outdoor course and a variety of shooting challenges on the indoor range. All together there was a possibility of one hundred and three points.

Five of the eight shooters braved the elements and competed on the outdoor field target course. The snowfall was pretty steady during the entire outdoor match, but it seemed to bother Don the least as he shot a 22/24 to place first in the outdoor section of the match. Dennis was close behind with a 21 and Mike placed third with a 19/24. We then headed back inside to let our guns warm up and the lenses on the scopes had to go through the fog up and clear up period. That gave us all time to have a hot chocolate and get out of the layers of outdoor clothing.

While the five were outdoors shooting, Hans, Bert and Danny completed the indoor events. There were four events indoors, including a stationary chalk shoot, a moving chalk shoot, toy soldier sniping and a buffalo silhouette shoot. Ten pieces of chalk were lined up with about a half an inch sticking up for the stationary shoot. The moving chalk involved a rotating wheel with nine pieces of chalk peeking briefly over the wall by about one half inch and then disappearing. We were given ten shots to hit the nine pieces of chalk. For the snipers in the group, ten toy army men were place along the edge of a table at twenty yards and we were given ten shots to take them out. They had to be knocked right off the table to count, which would not be a problem with a solid hit, as it turned the soldier into green plastic shrapnel. The buffalo shoot involved looking at the cardboard target with the scoring template in place, then trying to remember where the ten ring was located, with no markings on the target and shooting the buffalo five times, with a minute and a half time limit. It was a lot of fun.

Hans, Dennis, Don, Bert and I all managed to turn the ten pieces of stationary chalk into dust. On the moving pieces of chalk, I managed to create nine dust clouds with nine shots. The one shot, one kill snipers were Hans, Dennis, Bert and I. Bert proved to have the best memory and a steady hand by scoring a perfect fifty out of fifty on the buffalo silhouette target. With a strong showing indoors and out, Dennis was the top gun for the day.

At this point we had a feed of fried chicken, French fries and salads. We went up and chose our favorite mini cap gun off the tree as a prize and also picked a gift from the pile under the tree. It was a great day and a special thank you to Hans and Bert who took care of the indoor events. Thanks also to the guys who chipped in and helped Dennis and I with the outdoor set-up and tear down. I hope to see everyone in the spring for another season of field target shooting.

CALIFORNIA ACCURATE RIFLE SHOOTERS

October 18, 2003 Field Target Match

The fourth CARS field target match was again held at Prado Olympic Shooting Park. While the temperature was hot (95+ F°), the usual s-s wind (switching-swirling) was fairly mild at 2-3 mph. However, this was still a factor at several of the farther targets with smaller hit zones. We had only six participants today, partly because our benchrest contingent was shooting at a major center fire match. Of particular note, 4 of the 6 were shooting spring guns. In addition, we posted the actual target distances on the scorecards. It was interesting that advanced posting only helped for a few of the longer distances for a couple shooters who had somewhat underpowered scopes.

Leo Hwong (no surprise!) took first place with a most impressive 39 ex 44 (89%). Tom Olivieri had some equipment problems, but once they were straightened out, he was right on. Now for the springers --- Mike Wann returned from a long hiatus to shoot an incredible 20 (45%), and for our course, that is a fantastic spring gun score! Vince Pacheco, Greg Fuller and Dave Frederick (first outing with CARS for Dave) also did very well. BTW, Dave managed to "clean" two of the hardest targets on the course.

After the match, we held our "Quigley Match" --- by consensus, the Turner Bucket Target was placed at 50 yards and shot off-hand, with the best of five shots being the winner. Well, this was one difficult event, in that of the five participants, only Mike and Dave hit the bucket (1/5). Their shoot-off was then held in the classic field target position. Both of these guys did very well, but Mike hit the target 4/5 times, while Dave hit it twice. Congratulations to all for their fine shooting on a fairly difficult course! Afterwards, we stopped at one of the local eateries for a well-deserved luncheon, tall cool beverages and some interesting discussions.

CALIFORNIA ACCURATE RIFLE SHOOTERS

December 27, 2003 Field Target Match

The day started out with temperatures in the high 30's and low 40's, and by the end of the match it was about 50 degrees. The change in air density and the effects of low temperature on spring gun mechanics created real problems for sighting the guns and maintaining a consistent point of impact. Of course, the infamous Prado wind factor also contributed to a mild state of havoc, especially for the longer shots. This month I indicated the actual distance for one of the targets on each lane. An analysis of the results suggested that knowing the distance of the target was not that much help. This was also confirmed at our last match when all the distances were posted.

Overall scores were substantially lower than at previous matches. Tom Olivieri was shooting superbly until the last 2 lanes; however, he still had a most impressive 28 ex 40 (70%) for the day's highest score. Leo Hwong was using his trusty TX200, and shot a 17 (43%), which is a most respectable score on a tough course with climatic conditions that were quite problematic. Special mention should be made of one of our regular shooters, Phil Lindberg, who brought his nephew Tim for his first CARS event. Results are shown in the table below.

We tried a 12 shot air pistol match after the regular rifle field target event. Five people participated in this side shoot. Most were using match pistols with open sights, and all decided to shoot the targets from the off-hand position. Six targets with hit zones from 1" to 1.5" were placed at distances of 10 to 17 yards. Whether it was fatigue, frustration or difficulty, most of the 12 shots were misses, with 3 people managing to get 2 hits. We're not giving up just yet....

Airgun Odyssey A review by Jay Olson-Goude

Steve Hanson's new book, <u>Airgun Odyssey</u>, is a great addition to any air gun lover's library. Steve is a Tacomabased gun writer. The depth and breadth of the information in his new book is a good indication of the passion Steve has for airguns. The only aspect of the sport that Steve does not touch on is the precision ten-meter game. In addition to Steve's writing, there are also one chapter apiece from guest-authors Ken Reeves and Larry (ld) Durham.

The book is profusely illustrated with photographs, diagrams and the occasional cartoon. Most of the photos are also Steve's handiwork, but if Steve himself appears in the photo, it will most often have Steve's son Alan's name in the credit. Steve's got Alan working on a good start to his own journalism career!

Chapter 1 is an overview of the history of air guns and their development. In addition to writing about the development of the guns themselves, Steve also gives an overview of the sport of air gunning in this country.

Chapter 2 is an in-depth look at the various types of propulsion system available in today's marketplace. Spring-piston guns are covered, along with pneumatic and precharged-pneumatic guns of course, but the chapter also covers less well-known systems such as the air cartridge and the air capsule.

Chapter 3 delves into the world of pellets, testing and ballistics. Included in the pellet section is an interesting piece about the development of the Crosman Premier pellet.

Chapter 4 is all about hunting, varmint and pest control with airguns. Steve's experience and passion are clearly visible in this chapter. The airgun quarry discussed in this section ranges from grasshoppers to raccoons and marmots.

Chapter 5 is where I first turned when I received the book: American Field Target. A general overview of the sport is presented, along with information about scopes and popular field target guns. Steve queried a group of top field target shooters as to their primary equipment, and backup equipment. He also asked them what they believed to the biggest challenge in the sport, and how they would rank such things as equipment, technique, practice and any other factors in determining the success of a shooter. The answers given are extremely interesting and are probably worth the price of the book in and of themselves. The AAFTA rules are included and the whole chapter is full of photographs including many taken at the 2000 World/ US National Championships. That match is particularly near and dear to me because of all the effort myself and others in our club expended in preparation for hosting the match.

Chapter 6 is an introduction to BR4000, which is the latest iteration of BR-50/BRV.

Chapters 7 and 8 are extensive tests of a bunch of airguns. Chapter 7 covers current production guns, while Chapter 8 cover some old favorites that are out of production. Steve's testing methodology is as detailed and objective as I've ever seen. My only negative reaction to this testing procedure was the fact that springers were accuracy tested using the same rigid rest that was used for the recoilless guns. It is common knowledge that recoiling spring guns rarely exhibit their best accuracy from a rest. My doubts were eliminated a month or so later when I received an addendum to the book. This section that was inadvertently left out of the book described how Steve employed special high-speed video cameras to document each guns firing behavior when shot from a rigid rest. This information was then analyzed to determine the optimum mounting position for that particular gun. These are test reports that can actually be relied upon – not inflated manufacturers results or <u>Airgun Digest</u> type tests.

Chapter 9 is Ken Reeves' contribution to the book and outlines his philosophy and methods of tuning spring-piston airguns.

The final chapter, written by Larry Durham, is an in-depth description of his creation of an American-designed and constructed air rifle especially for the sport of field target. The chapter follows the entire process from ideas in ld's head to the National Championship-winning rifle in Steve Schulz's hands. ld's design is currently in production as the US-FT by Mac1 Airguns.

The book has two appendices: on a very complete listing of periodicals, supplies and services; the other a listing of State sources for hunting information and regulations.

I enjoyed the book a lot - I've already recommended it to some people looking to get started in air gunning, and I think you'll like it too.

The book retails for \$33.95 in hardcover and \$28.95 in soft cover, but is available for less at the publisher's website.
